Statistics about the French Speaking Marcé 2016 (Nov 2015 to Oct 2016) Elisabeth Glatigny Dallay 19th SMF congress, Beaune Nov, 2016

Since 2012, we present our website statistics and since then we have recorded regular increases.

- An average 9117 visits each month (to compare in 2015 : 7715 visits)
- An average 299 visits per day. This number is increasing: 100 (in 2012), 130 (in 2013), 244 (in 2015) and 299 this year.
- Number of pages seen per visit: 4.4 Here too this number progresses: 2 to 3 pages in 2012, 3 in 2013, 4.1 last year.
- Most visited pages: Since we record our visits the Mother Baby Unit page has always been the
  most seen. In this page you have a map and all the addresses of the units in France and Belgium.
  This year, as usual, this page is the most seen with, for example, 949 visits in October 2016, then
  you have the page Congress (352) and « présentation » = about us (310). Not far after comes the
  page DU (University Diplomas) and trainings.

Our website is being updated about every two months. We send an email to ask information about the next

update and we then post on the French listserve encouraging our members to look at our updated website. It's interesting to notice that the most frequently seen pages are those which also have the more updates.

Unfortunately we can not compare our statistics with other similar website. We'd like to know about the International website or other regional groups or websites like « maman blues »...

Showing our results every year is probably a stimulating way to reinforce our members who help us keeping our website updated.

#### **Japanese Regional Group**

The establishment of the Japanese Regional Group of the Marcé Society

I am pleased inform the members of the Marcé Society that a Regional Group has been established in Japan and now boasts 35 members, most of whom have joined within the past two years. The group includes 13 psychiatrists, nine obstetricians, five clinical psychologists, five midwives and three paediatricians, one of whom works for a community health centre. Although the numbers are small there is a good balance of professions, which will serve to promote the development of multidisciplinary models of care in perinatal mental health.

The Japanese Regional Group was set up in the summer of 2016 following the September 2014 biennial International Marcé Society Congress in Swansea. The initiative was suggested by Dr. Jane Hanley who provided the "Guide to Setting up a New Branch of the Marcé Society". Helpful input was contributed by a number of leading Marcé International members including Dr Nine Glangeaud. Many of the supporters were friends of mine from the 1990s when I worked with the late Professor Kumar in Perinatal Psychiatry at King's College / Maudsley Hospital. My colleague Dr Hiroshi Yamashita, Professor Tadaharu Okano from Mie University and myself enjoyed a creative exchange of ideas with Marcé Society members between

1997 and 2002 while contributing to a cross-cultural study on postnatal depression set up by Prof Kumar and Prof Jon Cox. Yoshida and Yamashita are both perinatal psychiatrists as well as child psychiatrists and work in the same academic department at Kyushu University.

There were only seven Marcé Society members in Japan when I returned from Swansea in 2014 and began the process of setting up the Regional Group. However, a number of colleagues had published or presented their work in English in the field of perinatal psychiatry and had accessed an international audience.

Another asset was a 15-year grant provided by the Ministry of Health and Welfare in Tokyo in 1992 for research into the assessment and treatment of perinatal women and their families. The grant holder was Professor Nakano, an obstetrician in our University, who fully appreciated the importance of mental health in perinatal care. A number of professionals including psychiatrists, obstetricians, midwives, health visitors, nurses and community health centre staff worked together on the project.

This work led to the development of a policy prescribing that perinatal mental health assessment and care will be provided by obstetric staff from the start of pregnancy, continuing without interruption to one month after birth. After that care is provided under an existing policy offering growth and developmental check-ups to infants and young children up to three years old. The project members met again under this new government policy.

Having established the Japanese Marcé Society with 35 founding members, we reported this achievement to the president of the Marcé Society. Now we can report that the Japanese Regional Group is fully fledged with Keiko Yoshida as President, Dr Hiroshi Yamashita as Secretary General and Dr Yoko Sagara (Obstetrician) as Treasurer.

The Marcé Society Conference in Melbourne in September 2016 will be a big event for the Japanese Regional Group, half of whom plan to attend the conference. We look forward to meeting many friends there.

Meetings will take place annually and will provide a forum for the presentation of research and discussion of service developments. Between meetings members will communicate by email, telephone and video conferencing.

I hope that this account of the development of the Japanese Regional Group serves to give you a clear picture of our work here in Japan.

## **Spanish Regional Group**

The fifth Perinatal Mental Health Annual Conference Alfonso Gil, Spanish Regional Group Representative

On 10th June 2016 the fifth Annual Conference on Perinatal Mental Health was held in the auditorium at the University Hospital Dexeus in Barcelona. It was an complete success with the auditorium filled to capacity.

Firstly, we would like to highlight the opening presentation which was given by Dr. Alinne Barrera, psychologist and associate professor at the University Palo Alto, California (USA). She shared her knowledge of perinatal depression prevention through information and communication technology, also know as TIC from its Spanish abbreviation. The focal point of her presentation was a study about prevention which used TIC with Spanish and English speaking participants. Following this talk, there was an excellent talk/debate given by Dr. LLuïsa Garcia-Esteve and Dr. Susana Andrés Perpiña entitled "The coexistence of fear and hope: bonding difficulties." Also joining them on the stage was Kerry, a survivor of postnatal depression, who gave a moving testimony of her experience.

The conference was divided into two sessions, the first being dedicated to pregnancy and neurodevelopment risk factors; more specifically the effects of iron levels on the neurodevelopment of the fetus and baby, the prenatal effects of consuming fish and acetaminophen on neurodevelopment and the prenatal factors associated with postnatal bonding difficulties. The second session was reserved for domestic violence and perinatal stress. A review was given of the association between domestic violence and perinatal depression and a study of the impact of domestic violence on children and descendants was presented. Finally, Dr. Gracia Lasheras presented a study which was carried out by the Quirón Dexeus Hospital regarding the factors associated with the adjustment of mothers whose babies are admitted to neonatal intensive care units. She demonstrated the importance of strategies when dealing with these situations.

Once the second session had finished, Dr. Alfonso Gil-Sánchez presented the audience with a proposal to create the Latin American Alliance for Maternal Mental Health, also known as AISMMA from its Spanish abbreviation. This alliance hopes to be a coalition of organizations in Latin America who are committed to improving the mental health and wellbeing of women and their children during pregnancy and the first year after birth.

Prizes for the best oral communication were awarded as follows; first prize went to Maria Emilia Dip and the team at the Universitari Vall d'Hebrón hospital for their presentation entitled "Proyecte Germanas Hospital Universitari Vall d'Hebrón" ("Sisters Project Univeritari Vall d'Hebrón Hospital). Joint second prize was awarded to Dr. Isabel Irigoyen and the team at the Hospital Clinico in Zaragoza for their work entitled "Integración de un Programa de Psiquiatría Perinatal en un Hospital de Día psiquiátrico" ("Integration of a perinatal psychiatric programme in psychiatric day care") and Dr. Estel Gelabert from the Barcelona Universitat Autónoma and the team from the Perinatal Psychiactric programme at the Hospital Clínic in Barcelona for their talk entitled "Dimensiones de Tempramento y Carácter en mujeres con depresión postparto y su relación con variables clínicas." ("Measurements of temperament and character in women with postnatal depression and the connection to clinical variables.")

Following the closing of the conference, the General Assembly of the Spanish society Marcé (MARES) was held during which Dr. Gracia Lasheras was appointed as President for a four year term. Dr. LLuïsa Garcia-Esteve stepped down from her role as President of MARES over the last four years, in which she undertook the enormous task of founding and creating the Society. What's more, Dr. Jorge Osma was named as the Vice President.

#### **UKIMS Regional Group**

The Welsh Government has committed 2016 and beyond to developing the perinatal mental health services within Wales. For a country which has an area of just over 20 thousand square kilometres and a population of 3 million, it has shown great spirit and determination to improve the mental health of mothers and their families across the country.

The value of primary and secondary care health professionals, together with non-government and charitable organisations has

been recognised and there has been significant work discussing and conceptualising the formation of perinatal mental health services to consider; clinical identification and referral decision making, networking and care pathways, resulting in personcentered care. These proposed referral options and identified referral pathways, combined with training options, have the ability to empower GPs, midwives, health visitors and primary care workers to consider the perinatal mental health service in a more multifactorial way.

Earlier last month the Welsh Government hosted, in Cardiff, the capital city, a conference entitled 'Community of Practice - Improving Perinatal Mental Health Services'. The large venue was full to capacity and several Marcé members were present, including lan Jones, Sue Smith, Alain Gregoire, Lisa Kinsella & Susan Pawlby. I had the honor of holding a workshop on the


Marcé society, and together with lan, judged the best poster presentation. The prize was one year's subscription to the Marcé Society.

# Introducing the Perinatal Mental Health Society (PNMHS)

# **History of the Perinatal Mental Health Society**

(written in October, 2016, by Kathie Wisner)

At the Perinatal Mental Health Conference in Chicago, IL, a group of perinatal specialists (listed below) met to from 6 to 8 PM, Tuesday, Nov 3, 2015, at the Allerton Hotel, Ogden Board Room for a detailed consideration of - Should a Marcé regional group be initiated? The invited work group included:

- K. Wisner, MD MS (Psychiatry), Chair
- C. Beck, DNS (Nursing)
- C. Clark, MD MSc (Psychiatry)
- C. Hoffman, MD, MPH (MFM)
- M. Howard, PhD (Psychology)
- S. Meltzer-Brody, MD, MPH
- E. Miller, MD MPH (MFM)
- M. O'Hara, PhD, Psychology
- B. Parry (Psychiatry)
- D. Tucker (administration for conference and NASPOG).

The group was unanimous in the proposal to begin a perinatal mental health society for North America. The discussion included:

- Advancing an agenda specific to North American members and our health care systems, advocacy in our countries, and leadership opportunities for younger faculty.
- A strong financial health plan from the initiation, with capable and affordable organizational management.
- A commitment to actively engage in and develop the new organization.
- Cindy Lee Dennis was nominated by the group to be the Canadian representative.
- Sandraluz Lara-Cinisomo agreed to represent Mexico and other North American Spanish speaking countries.
- When the criteria to become a regional group of the Marcé Society are met (anticipated for January, 2108, after the next PNMHS meeting in Chicago), the name will become Marcé of North America (MONA), as suggested by Mike O'Hara.

Debby Tucker (Debra Tucker Associates, LLC) agreed to be our organizational manager, and we worked with her to develop our Constitution and Articles of Incorporation. The startup funding was generously provided by the organizational committee members. We have our regulatory requirements at this point and are prepared to move forward with membership to the Perinatal Mental Health Society, Inc., in 2017.

We look forward to collaborating with our partners, Postpartum Support International, Postpartum Progress and the North American Society for Psychosocial Obstetrics and Gynecology to advocate on behalf of childbearing women.

Our vision is a world in which childbearing women, their children and families enjoy the benefits of mental health and well-being.

#### Postdoctoral Fellowship in Reproductive Mood Disorders

The Center for Women's Mood Disorders within the Department of Psychiatry at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill hosts the only postdoctoral training fellowship program in the field of Reproductive Mood Disorders funded by NIH. The program, directed by David R. Rubinow, M.D. and Susan S. Girdler, Ph.D., is designed to train both MD and PhD scientists, and foster the development of researchers with expertise in both the biological basis and clinically relevant (predicative) phenotypes of reproductive mood disorders (perinatal depression, premenstrual dysphoric disorder, and perimenopausal depression). Training will involve a broad-based and integrative perspective, involving not only psychiatry but cardiology and genetics, endocrinology, neuroscience, and obstetrics/gynecology.

The program's emphasis is on training in pathophysiological mechanisms that underlie reproductive mood disorders. The trainees will develop mastery in the following: reproductive hormonal physiology and signaling; methods for manipulating the reproductive system; and clinical phenomenology of reproductive mood disorders. Additionally, trainees will develop expertise in one of three methodological training tracks: Neurosciences, Genetics, or Stress Physiology. Fellows who complete this program will be poised to

become independent researches, having the requisite foundation to examine biobehavioral mechanisms in reproductive mood disorders and the ability to identify therapeutic biologic targets in their future independent research.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill represents an ideal setting for this program because it possesses a well-known collaborative infrastructure, a vibrant women's mood disorder clinical program (which includes the first inpatient perinatal depression program in the country), and a critical mass of researchers in reproductive mood disorders with a track record of success.

This is a two year training program, with possible extension of a third year. Salary is consistent with the NIH post-doctoral stipend levels. Criteria for selection include demonstrated experience in reproductive mood disorders (or a highly related area), a strong potential to become an independent investigator, strength in verbal and written communication, curiosity, and genuine commitment to advancing the scientific rigor of the reproductive mood disorders field. Applications with interdisciplinary interests are strongly encouraged. U.S. citizenship or permanent residency is required.
